Creating stability for children who need that extra support

DEDICATED youth worker Clare Stabler admitted she will always be there for the young people she helps and was honoured to have success at the Golden Apple Awards.

The night was a chance to celebrate and reward the superb achievements and endless dedication to those in classrooms, nurseries and universities and all manner of workplaces.

And among those showing the dedication that led to her being nominated Best Support Worker was Clare, who gave up her family time over Christmas so that she could be there for a child in need.

Clare has been a youth worker for six years and is part of the North Allerdale Development Trust. She loves what she does and hopes she will be a source of stability for all the young people she works with.

After winning the Golden Apple she said: "It was a privilege to win it and I'm really proud to win."

"I have been doing youth work for about six years now and it's nice that I'm now at that point where I have seen children from the beginning of their journey to the end. They've finished school and they're going on to be brilliant young people."

"It has been a real privilege." The modest support worker added: "We're a small, dedicated and caring team and I couldn't do it without them."

"We really care about the children and I think that is what is at the heart of it."

Loving her role means she wants to be there for as many young people as she can and hopes that giving youngsters the ability to contact them via social media will open another door for communication.

She added: "I think when you get that chance to build a relationship with a young person then it's not just

a nine-to-five job, where you clock off at 5pm then don't think about them until the next morning. That's just not how it works."

"There have been many nights, especially a Sunday night, when I'm going into work on a Monday and think: what is going to happen today?"

"We do a lot of out-of-hours care and it's a simple way, just through social media. We don't force it on the young people."

"It's a case of them knowing where we're at if they want us, and when you get phone calls like that or whatever comes through you can only do as much as you can."

"Just being there gives them that stability that some of them don't have."

"At least they know there is some-

one out there that is going to answer the call and help them when they need it.

"I just love doing my job." Teamwork has paid off for the diverse group that Clare is part of as the whole team took an award for best use of technology.

North Allerdale Development Trust team member Sue McAlister said: "It's brilliant to win, it's amazing."

Leader Sandra Keaveney said: "The win has been absolutely amazing because of the hard work the team has put in and all the work we have done with the schools and the young people."

"It has been a labour of love. We weren't expecting it."

"It's the first year we have done this and it works."

The trust's media tutor Lyndsey Walker explained how they have been helping the young people learn the different aspects of film-making.

"We have a cycle where we mix different students from different schools and the groups will make a film on a subject of their choice," she said.

"By doing this, the children learn about film-making, having the chance to work with green screen and other media-related items."

"It's a lot of different things put together to help get them interested in media and give them the skills to make a final project."

"The young people seem to really engage with media and we're there to guide them and show them things, but it's amazing to see how they guide us."

"Nowadays they're so tech-savvy it's amazing."

After taking the win for the best use of technology an excited Ms Walker added: "Winning the Golden Apple is amazing - it's our first full year and to get here is unbelievable."

Girls gang comes out on top

FLYING the flag for girls was the Girls Gang, who took the win in the Best Community Initiative.

The community youth council for disadvantaged girls, based in Kells and Woodhouse in Whitehaven, has been working tirelessly to help empower girls and give them opportunities they wouldn't normally have.

County councillor Emma Williamson is a driving force behind the group and said: "Our girls are our inspiration, they're our future."

"We took a group of amazing girls from a deprived community and they shone. They saw issues and they wanted to tackle them."

"The girls are an inspiration. They want to change the world and we want to do it with them."

Girls Gang have been flexing their muscles helping the environment... and were so enthused have even recorded a song about it.

Suzanne Wilson from the University of Lancaster credits the girls for everything that has been achieved.

"All we have done is enabled them to realise their dreams," she said.

"This award is in recognition of them and all the hard work they have put in."
